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From the Senior Pastor

July 2009

I lost my cell phone a couple of weeks ago. I looked everywhere: in the car, the house, our camp. I retraced my steps and went back to stores I had been in. I looked through my office at the church. No luck. The phone was gone. Luckily, I have insurance on my cell phone, so I called AT&T to make arrangements to get a new one. With only a minor dent in my checking account, the new cell phone arrived the next day. Case closed. My connectivity restored, I went on about my business.

Yesterday I found my old cell phone. It was right where I had put it, on a bookshelf in the living room in the parsonage. It wasn't lost at all. I had merely forgotten where I had placed it. Of course I returned that phone to the insurance company and got on with the business of deciphering the directions to the new phone.

This whole incident has prompted me to think about other losses I have suffered in my life. Some losses are more easily rectified than others, aren't they? Some, like my cell phone, merely need something new to replace that which has been lost. Others, no matter how good our insurance, can never be replaced.

Many times, our first experience with loss is the death of a pet. When I was a little girl, my dog, Inky, died. It happened while I was at school. I guess he had been sick, but I knew nothing about that. All I know is that when I returned home from school, Inky was gone. My parents told me that he had been sick and he got so sick that he died. I only knew that I missed my dog. I cried and was sad for a time, but eventually I got over my grief and went on with my life. But I never forgot that little black dog of questionable parentage.

As life goes on, we experience many more losses. Some are devastating in their effect and others somehow get absorbed into our lives. When my grandparents died, I could rationalize that they were old and sick and that it was time for God to welcome them home. When my parents died, the loss was much sharper and, for the first time in my life, I felt like an orphan. I was nobody's little girl anymore. My loss was keen.

We all know about loss. It is, after all, part of life. We lose cell phones, car keys, jobs, hearts, health, and people we love. We try to recover what we can, replace what we can, and live with the loss of that which is irreplaceable.

But as many times as we lose something or someone, there is so much that we find in our lives. The unexpected friend. The unanticipated love that blossoms. The joy of becoming a parent. The tears of happiness shed as we watch a precious child or grandchild get married. The haunting melody of a beautiful piece of music. The wonder of a sunrise on Cadillac Mountain. The immeasurable bliss of belonging to our Lord and Savior. For each loss there is the possibility of joy.

My plan is to go through the rest of my life recognizing that loss will come, but anticipating a new joy around every corner. The love of God makes that optimism possible. The grace of God makes that inevitable. Thank You, God.

TRAVEL BINGO


Summer travel is fun, but sometimes getting to the destination can take a long time. Try this homemade bingo game to entertain you and your family while you vacation this summer.

What you need:

- Sheets of 8¹/₂" x 11" paper (one for each player)
- Stickers (16 for each player)
- Pencil, pen, marker or crayon

What you do:

1. Before your trip, list different things you might see as you travel.
2. Take each 8¹/₂" x 11" sheet of paper and fold it in half, from top to bottom. Fold it in half again from top to bottom. Then fold it in half from side to side and then again. Unfold the paper and you should have 16 equal-sized squares, four across horizontally and four down vertically.
3. Family members write one thing from the list in each of the 16 squares. They can place them in any order. For non-readers, someone can draw pictures in each square.
4. Put the sheets and stickers in the car in an easy-to-reach place.
5. While traveling, when you see an object that's on your card, say it out loud. Put a sticker in that square.
6. The first person to get four in a row wins the first round. The first person to fill two rows wins the second round. The first person to fill the entire sheet wins the game.
