From the Pastor

I have recently begun re-reading my favorite books, the Mitford Series. books, now nine in number, chronicle the life and times of Father Timothy Kavanagh, an Episcopal priest and servant of God. In my "humble" opinion, these books should be required reading for anyone preparing for the ordained Christian ministry and probably for everyone else as well. These books do not fit into any particular genre. Rather they transcend the normal categories of literature we generally assign to the written word. Jan Karon wrote these novels and, while I enjoy her writing style, it is within the content of the books and in the characters who come alive in the pages where I find the true meat of the stories. I have been reading these works for years and they have never failed to capture my attention and imagination and challenge my faith and the way in which I carry out my ministry in Christ's name.

Father Tim's story is that of a man who grows into his calling as a priest. You can imagine how I would resonate with this story, as one does not become a priest or minister overnight, but rather through a series of life experiences. Father Tim learns how to accept himself and his past, his shortcomings and his undeserved calling. It is a beautiful story of grace and hope. Ms. Karon presents us with a flawed but redeemable character who is overcome by the grace of God and lives to tell the tale. I don't know if the author based

Father Tim's character on anyone she knew, but Tim is real and human.

One of the best parts of the book is the way in which Father Tim expresses his thoughts. For example, when his wife, the lovely Cynthia, gives him a red Mustang convertible for his birthday, he is stunned and not sure he should (or could) accept it. "But, dear, it's red and I'm a priest!" This made me laugh as I looked back at all the things I have worried over in my ministry — what was "proper" and what was not. As I said, Father Tim is delightfully human. The books are full of Bible quotations and wonderful prayers. In short, the books are a delight.

But the very best thing about the Miford series is the kind of priest Father Tim becomes. He doesn't sit in his office (unless he is studying) but rather goes out into the community to be a part of its heartbeat. He doesn't lecture his congregation, but, rather, shares with them the important lessons God imparts to him and others with whom he comes in contact. He is there when there is sickness. death, divorce, loneliness, or need. He is a true priest in every sense of the word - the very reason why I would make this series required reading for any budding pastor. It matters very little what denomination Tim is a part of - his example transcends the flimsy boundaries we might construct between our churches.

The good news is that one does not have to be a budding minister or long-time

pastor to read and enjoy these books and, most importantly, to learn from them. One does not have to be male or female, young or old - just human and desirous of a more intimate relationship with God. The Mitford books can show us the way.

Make your way to Jesup Library and borrow one of the books. It is best to read them in order, but each one stands on its own. Let me know what you think. Please don't hold me too harshly to Father Tim's standard of ministry – I'm working on it, but I'm not yet there. Enjoy!

THE WAY, THE TRUTH, THE LIFE


Play this game with a group of friends to remind you to follow Jesus.

What you need:


- · Large space for running
- 3 jump ropes or 9 traffic cones

What you do:

- Using jump ropes or traffic cones, form lines at both ends of the playing area. Also make a dividing line in the middle. Designate one side as "The Way" and the other as "The Truth." The center line is "The Life."
- Choose one person to stand in the middle of the center line. He or she is the caller, yelling, "The way!" or "The truth!" or "The life!" The rest of the players also start on the middle line.
- When a location is called, players run as fast as possible to the designated area. The last person to arrive switches places with the caller.
- When "The Life" is called, players run to the center line and raise both hands. No one gets out.
