Who Is That Singing?

Excerpt from [Acts 8:26-40](#)

"Philip ran up to the chariot and heard him reading the prophet Isaiah. He asked, 'Do you understand what you are reading?' He replied, 'How can I, unless someone guides me?'"

One day, when our children were still very young, a Beatles song came on the radio. I grew up listening to the Beatles so, of course, I began to sing along. Then our daughter, Alanna, asked, "Who is that singing?"

For a moment, I was taken aback by her question. How could she not know who is singing? Isn't that something that is passed on in the genes?

And then I remember thinking, if she doesn't know about the Beatles, what other things have I mistakenly assumed I would not need to tell her? Obviously, we cannot assume that our children have somehow brought with them, or will pick up somewhere, the most important things we have to share, including the Christian story of God's fierce and indefatigable love for the world.

One does not learn the story by osmosis. It has to be told. After all, the Christian faith is always just one generation away from extinction.

In Acts, we read about an Ethiopian official who, after a visit to Jerusalem, was reading the prophecies of Isaiah while he was riding in a chariot (you have to really want to read something to read it in a moving chariot). Philip was inspired to approach the chariot and asked, "Do you understand what you are reading?" And here is the Ethiopian's poignant reply: "How can I, unless someone guides me?"

Exactly. No one is born knowing the story of our faith. It has to be passed on, one generation at a time.

So teach your children, or your grandchildren, or the children of your church the story that has been shared with us. And, somewhere along the line, teach them about The Beatles also.

Prayer

God, you are here, there and everywhere. Equip us and inspire us to tell the story that has been shared with us. Amen.

News from Your Outreach Board

At its February 2013 meeting, your Outreach Board made donations to local, Maine, and international organizations. On behalf of our church, we made the following donations:

\$50.00 to Safe Family Exchange, Inc. This organization provides safe and pleasant court ordered exchanges of children between divorced or separated parents. Coordination and supervision are provided by salaried staff as well as volunteers. **Volunteers are always needed. Call 266-7620 for more information.**

\$50.00 to Island Connections. This MDI-based organization pairs volunteer drivers with elderly and disabled neighbors to drive them to vital health and life enhancing services. **Volunteers are always needed. Call**

\$50.00 to the Maine Lions P.E.T. Project. The Personal Energy Transportation project provides "Gifts of Mobility" to individuals in developing countries who do not have the use of their legs. Individual machines (see photo) are made which provide mobility through hand-cranked power. The labor costs are donated, but about \$250 is needed to purchase the materials for manufacture and shipping of each PET.



\$50.00 to International Partners in Mission. IPM works across borders of faith, culture, and economic circumstance with children, women, and youth to create partnerships that build justice, peace, and hope. IPM strives to provide opportunities for partnership that are personal and effective, in part, through their Immersion Experience program, allowing donors and friends to engage directly with their Project Partners from across the globe.

What an opportunity! Are you interested?

International Partners in Mission International, Staff Member Joe Cistone (from our own MDI!), joined us at our Outreach Board's February meeting. IPM's three primary areas of focus are: Project Partnerships, the Immersion Experience Program, and the Global Citizen Program. Our outreach board expressed great interest in the Immersion Experience Program. Trips are generally 7-9 days and are made to nine different countries (Tanzania, Italy, India, Kenya, El Salvador, Dominican Republic, Nicaragua, Brazil, Nepal) and within the USA. The itinerary of the Immersion Experience includes the following activities for participants:

- Spending time humbly in accompaniment, solidarity, and dialogue with Project Partners;
- Visiting sites of socio-cultural, environmental, historical, and political importance;
- Daily opportunities for learning, reflection, and sharing upon the reality experience in-country; and
- Pre-trip planning and post-trip partnerships.

Groups (from churches, academic institutions, corporations, etc.) work with IPM to plan for meaningful experiences. The bulk of the planning is already done as IPM has led many trips. The group does its own fundraising. However, there is a trip to the Dominican Republic this June that is being largely subsidized by a grant from a generous philanthropist. **The ONLY cost** the participant incurs is the airfare, approximately \$800.00. The group comprises participants from a variety of congregations and there are a couple of slots still available (as of our February meeting). If you are interested in this amazing (and affordable) experience, please contact **Debby Hammond at 288-8058** at your earliest convenience.
